Another feast of fellowship at MU

In the absence of the bulk of the MU leadership Team, senior member Kay Voltz stepped up (again) to lead our gathering last week and offer warm hospitality to guest speaker Marjorie Voss and her husband Royce, pictured below connecting with longtime friend and colleague Helen Collins.

Kay reports: Always elegant, always charming and always vibrant, Margorie maintains a keen interest in the church, community and the world after many years of service and involvement. Her warmth and obvious care for people shine through.

Marjorie shared her journey of 65 years of MU membership and leadership. Highlights of her talk included anecdotes from her service as a member of the National Council of Women and the preparations for celebrations of 120 years of advocating for all women through that group.

Marjorie also spoke of how important MU has been in her life and enriched her Christian journey. MU supported her when she was a a young mum having lost a bub. That care led her into 65 years of friendship, fellowship and service, initially at Indooroopilly and now for many years at Bribie Island. As an active member of the MU Development team, Marjorie is always looking for forums and opportunities to promote the work and values.

St Paul's has many years of connection with Marjorie through MU and through the work of her husband Royce in his capacity as former CEO of Anglicare forerunner Anglican Homes for the Aged





were he worked closely with Manly Wynnum MU member Ann Stannard and helped form strong links of pastoral care and support through fundraising that has led to the deep friendship and fellowship we share today. Both Margorie and Royce were keen to hear about MU activities such as our focus of awareness raising of Domestic Violence issues and the Red Brench project and of course our experience of gathering in the Chapel of Lota House. Royce also has a big heart for E M Tooth and its residential care efforts and will certainly have a few thoughts about the current developments at the Lota House site.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

At least once a year, Christians reflect on Jesus' prayer for His disciples, expressing the hope that: "they may be one so that the world may believe" (John 17:21).

Congregations and parishes worldwide engage in the exchange of preachers and arrange special ecumenical celebrations and prayer services. This unique experience is initiated by the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is an international Christian ecumenical observance kept annually between Ascension and Pentecost in the Southern Hemisphere. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is annually coordinated by the World Council of Churches, with participation by its member Churches, which include the Assyrian Church of the East, the Oriental Orthodox Churches, the Eastern Orthodox Churches, the Old Catholic Church, the Moravian Church, the Lutheran Churches, the Anglican Communion, the Mennonite Churches, the Methodist Churches and the Reformed Churches, as well as the Baptist Churches and the Pentecostal Churches. The Roman Catholic Church, which is an observer in the World Council of Churches, also celebrates the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

2025 Marks the 1700th Anniversary of the Christian Ecumenical Council Nicaea.


Therefore the theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2025 is:

"Do you believe this?" (John 11:26).

The First Council of Nicaea, held in 325 AD, was the first ecumenical council convened by Roman Emperor Constantine I to address theological disputes within the early Christian church, particularly the Arian controversy. It resulted in the Nicene Creed, which defines the nature of Jesus as divine and co-equal with God the Father, and established a common date for Easter.

The 2025 prayers and reflections for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity were prepared by the brothers and sisters of the monastic community of Bose in northern Italy.
