Ailsa Gill writes: On the first Saturday of the month for 10 months of the year for the past 3 years, we have set our alarms for 5am and with loaded up cars, got ourselves to Meadowlands Road to the car boot sale at the Carina Church of the Nazarene. The previous day, we have spent time collecting items for sale, loading our vehicles and making sure we remembered chairs, water, sun protection, or like last Saturday, gloves and beanies. It was a very cold morning.

We have been blessed to have help from family members. Robyn's children have been amazing and the work Seb

does each month is very much appreciated as he helps us and others set up for the morning sale. Paul had been responsible for picking up and transporting the beautiful plants provided by Anice, which required quite a lot of lifting on and off the ute. Unfortunately Anice is not able to provide us with plants now as she is quite unwell. She is having trouble with her sight and mobility. Over many years, Anice has provided beautiful plants for our market days, and other fundraising events and she has done it willingly and with much love and care. Please keep Anice and Peter in your prayers.



We have been able to set up our stall next to where Chris has his coffee stand which means another pair of hands to help out at times and (another brain for the Saturday quiz). We have also been grateful that Fr Andrew has spent time with us each month since coming to the Parish. With Amanda now helping us with her wonderful

promotional skills, we are moving to stock more craft items and these are proving popular with customers. One lady returned last Saturday to show us what she had made with wool purchased the month before. We have many people who come regularly to the stall knowing that as well as the craft items, we stock good quality books, and interesting glassware, household and kitchen items (the meat slicer will always be remembered).

Thank to Marilyn, Erica and Sandra who are still providing items for the stall and to others who have come to help out or just pay us a visit at times. Nick has been available to help with



packing up which is really appreciated at the end of the morning. We would encourage everyone to come some Saturday and maybe you will find a bargain you never realised you needed (like a meat slicer).



Why do we do it? Put simply, because our church needs the funds, small though the amount we make is. With our small congregation and with interest rates going down again, there is not sufficient

income to continue to pay our way as a Parish. In addition, and perhaps more importantly,

we are working in the community. We have our Manly Parish sign, and try to remember to wear our name badges which have been noticed by customers. Our Parish extends to Gumdale and Tingalpa, so we are not very much outside the boundary. Please continue to support this ministry either by your presence, or by providing items for sale. We always need good quality and late edition books, children's books, as well as any craft/haberdashery/household items. It would be really appreciated if you could deliver the items to us at the stall if at all possible. Our cars are already well and truly fully loaded.



Celebrating the life of Olive Farr.

As always it was with mixed emotions we celebrated the long life of Olive Farr, one of our regular personalities in the front row of the chapel most Sunday mornings. At 101 Olive radiated a joy and peace that has been an inspiration to us all.

Colin Lim, a firm friend and former pastoral carer at E M Tooth wrote:



"Olive's faith and her daily walk with God was important as it gave her meaning and purpose. One of Olive's favourite songs is 'Safe in the Arms of Jesus' by Fanny Crosby. Fanny Crosby was blind at a



young age but learned to adapt and adopt an optimistic approach to life. Nurtured by Christians and guided by faith, she became a poet, teacher and advocate for the disabled in the 1800s, and wrote this song as a poem during a challenging period when she lost her first child when it was a baby. Therefore, her service has been shaped around the lyrics of this song, weaving them into a personalised tribute to Olive.



Safe in the arms of Jesus, Safe on His gentle breast; There by His love overshaded, Sweetly my soul shall rest. Hark! 'tis the voice of angels Borne in a song to me, Over the fields of glory, Over the jasper sea.

Olive, having lived over a century, faced the challenges of aging—losing her mobility, her sight, and many dear loved ones. Yet, through it all, she clung to the promise that she would one day rest in the arms of her Saviour. Just as Fanny Crosby, blind from infancy, found solace in her faith rather than in physical sight, Olive also rested in the unseen but unwavering presence of

Jesus. This verse beautifully echoes the comfort that sustained her through her final days."

It was wonderful to hear parts of Olive's story, including her motorcycle gang days and great love of professional wrestling... an interesting counter to her deep commitment as an officer in the Salvation Army!!! The table of memories contained so many interesting artifacts from her life, including medals from her war service as a VAD, and hard won certificates (including one recognising her as an official Gillette shaver!) Her beautiful craft work was on show and of course the wonderful oil paintings she produced in her later years.

Olive is deeply loved and greatly missed by her family and all at St Paul's!

May she rest in peace and rise in glory.


