### A Space to Think: Managing Hosea's Deeply Disturbing Imagery

Since I began my web series **Faith of Our Mothers** I've felt the weight of eventually needing to write about Gomer. Imagery of gender based violence in Biblical prophesy is a topic I can only approach with great trepidation, but Hosea 1 is in the lectionary for this Sunday, so it's time to take a deep breath and draw on whatever wisdom I can find. Gomer deserves a companion and advocate, just as the woman brought to Jesus in John 8 needed someone to convince a violent crowd to drop their stones.

I need to prepare myself to hear it read on Sunday, and maybe to prepare you as well. I read "Take for yourself a wife of whoredom", in Hosea 1:2 in the NRSV, and I'm not sure I can prepare anyone for that. Why do our translators insist on using such an offensive word? There is no escaping the violent and offensive language in this prophetic book, or the implication in it that this language comes from the mouth of God. A more sensitive choice of English words can't make the violence of Hosea 2 less triggering and insulting to the women in our churches who have been victims of sexual or family violence.

The symbolism of this prophetic book rests entirely on the cultural expectation that a man whose wife had been unfaithful could be expected to respond to her with violence. This violence is rejected in favour of grace, but it is first considered. This honest consideration of the violent impulses of a jealous man are hard to read, especially with so much symbolic overlap between the man and God.

Uncomfortable as all this is, the book of Hosea is in our Bibles, so we need to deal with it, somehow. Here are my thoughts on how we might do that.

The destruction of Israel was a permanent trauma and warning to the Southern Kingdom of Judah. It was a grief from which they would never recover. The people of Judah who collected prophetic writings into their canonical scriptures, would have wanted to include demonstrations that their northern siblings were warned in the strongest possible terms by YHWH's prophets about the coming annihilation. They would need to know that Israel was given every opportunity to repent. They must believe this if they are to trust the God worshiped by both kingdoms.

The book of Hosea employs extremely distasteful language and the sort of violent imagery that speaks to a culture that believed men have a right to use violence against unfaithful wives. Many men have learned to be more humble over the past century and a half. In our churches, the example of Jesus enduring excruciating shame for us is a constant reminder of the paradox that our highest calling is endure shame for each other.

The church is called to lend strength to men who are trying to expand their breathing space between feelings of shame and acts of violence. Our priority, though, must be the victims and potential victims. We must stand with women like Gomer who are the potential victims of shame based violence. Jesus showed us the way in John 8:1-11. There we see the violent impulse of one husband's shame spread to a whole group of men. With stones in their hands, they crave the death of a woman, like Gomer, accused of adultery.

Jesus doesn't add to the men's shame by making accusations. He re-engages their rational thinking with a question: "Is there one among you who has never sinned?" Is the sin of our community carried only by the women, or have the men contributed too? Hosea isn't ready to ask himself that question. He isn't ready to say to Gomer, "Neither do I condemn you." But he does let God pull him back from his violent impulses. And that is a good start.

So, let's pray:
Gentle God,
When shame clenches our fists,
And clouds our minds,
Teach us to breathe
And step back
And not condemn.
When called to join the condemning crowd,
Teach us to breathe
And step forward
And protect,
In the name of one who carried all our shame
And revealed the glory of humiliated love.
Amen

### The Vicar's Voice


I'm embracing the commitment to professional development lately. I've just renewed my Child Protection online training and next Thursday will be joining 30 or so other clergy at the mandatory Professional Ethics training we need to complete every three years.



Last Saturday I had the privilege of attending a workshop offered by the Australian Network of Spiritual Directors at St Joseph's, Nundah. The workshop was facilitated by Rev Dr Shannon Michael Pater, based in Massachusetts in the US. The day covered some heavy stuff under the heading of "Coming Home to the House of You: Internal Family Systems (IFS) and Spiritual Direction." His ongoing research integrates neurobiology (particularly Polyvagal Theory) and neuroplasticity (how the brain and nervous system sustainably shift), Attachment Theory (how we relationally connect and adapt), Internal Family Systems (the integration of internal protectors and exiles) and in this case, how trauma informed practice can shape spiritual direction.

Good stuff... with the added blessing of being in the same room with Shannon Michael who has been my own spiritual director for the last 4 years. We meet monthly by Zoom so a wonderful opportunity to meet in person.
