Anglican Cursillo Movement Diocese of Southern Queensland (Brisbane)

Jen Crisp writes: On 22-24 August the Anglican Cursillo movement of the Diocese of Brisbane held a two day weekend at the Luther Heights Conference Centre, a beautiful beachside location in Coolum.

The leader for the weekend was Ann Martin Victor (of Waterloo Bay Parish) and I had the honour to be a Proctor for this Cursillo weekend #83. We had a big team of 21 volunteers including four priests as Spiritual Advisors, four Proctors and all the table leaders, who attended training over several months in the lead up to the weekend. In case you are wondering, the proctors assist the leader, organise things in the background for the weekend to make sure everything runs smoothly for the IT, the talks, organising rooms etc and keeping everyone to schedule. We had made changes to the usual schedule this year, by cutting the weekend down from three to two days, so it was a bit of adjusting on the fly, but overall, it went very

The Cursillo weekend itself was a wonderful uplifting experience. The Holy Spirit was an active participant, and many participants (including the team!) experienced spiritual growth. It is a joy to watch the real transformation in people that can come from doing a Cursillo weekend. As intended by the program, many people are inspired by what they learn and go on to greater Christian leadership in their local environments. Some people, over the years, have even been called to the priesthood through their attendance at Cursillo.

Queensland Churches Environmental Network (QCEN) has developed a Season of Creation Daily Devotional.

QCEN sought contributions from a wide range of people, from different denominations and backgrounds, from all over Australia. The variety gives the devotions an incredible depth. At the same time, although each devotion is different, they all manage to portray a sense of awe at the wonder of creation. The devotions remind the reader of the interconnectedness of creation, of the peace we can feel when being in nature, and the beauty that is all around us.

Here's a sample: Day 7 For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God. (Rom 8:19) Read Romans 8:18-22

Reflect: I and some of my family have been blessed to be able to watch the turtles return to their special beach, Mon Repos near Bundaberg. This is the destination every year for the females who come to lay their eggs. These are the huge Loggerhead turtles. Their species is endangered. The mother makes her way, seemingly painfully, up the beach to a spot where she digs her nest. This is where she lays her eggs. The process takes some time. The look in the turtle's eye seems to be sadness and tiredness. It seems as if her whole being is groaning in this process of ensuring creation and the continuance of her kind. Once finished, the mother flaps sand onto the eggs and makes her way back to the water. When she reaches the water her movements are no longer



labored, they are graceful as she swims back out to sea. The hatchlings some time later will make that same journey. It is a dangerous journey because of birds, but they must do it. They are quicker. They rush to the water where new predators await. But they must do it. We too must wait, like the mother. Be patient. Do what we must do. Know that our freedom will come with Christ. Our natural place will be with Him. We will face the dangers and toils of a hostile world but we will come through. We are blessed by the grace of God who has given us the gift of Christ. There is our deeper water. There is our place.

Pray: God of all our dreaming, come take us in Your arms. Lead us onward to the deeper parts of ourselves.

Bring us closer to the deeper heart of Your love, Safe and calm through Jesus the Christ. Amen

You CAN see the both the wood AND the trees!!!

Season of Creation feeds my soul and I'm glad we are a faith community that embraces this liturgical time of year. Our gathering rite, statement of faith and preface echo the Creation themes present visually in our decorations in the chapel. We are part of a worldwide, big picture ecumenical wave of prayer over these weeks!

Last Sunday at Lota Foreshore during our Stare at the Sea reflection time I was struck by the bigness and the minuteness of our created world. I sat smack in front of this glorious she-oak and listened to the breeze whistle through the needle like leaves as it towered over



After a bit I began to focus on the detail...
the gnarled rough texture of the bark and the ghostly
remnants of branches that have gone but left an
impression on the bark. Ants scurry over it, birds fly
in and out and the blowing made patterns of light and
shade. I even convinced myself that the streamers of
toilet paper trapped in it were gossamer threads of
prayer rather than evidence of fecklessness!

What might you notice if you slow down to look and listen this week? What attitude adjustment could come from pausing to ponder and stare at a tree?
