their group's really valuable work that provides violence prevention, gender equality, and respectful culture training across

ADVENT BEGINS AND WE SHARE CREATIVITY AND SYMBOLS

Sandra Davis continues her series on our tapestry cushion displayed during the Season of Advent.

The first of the four Advent cushions, worked by Harline Dalton in 2001 and held here by Benjamin, brother-in-law of recent Baptism dad Ellliott Gibson, is especially relevant to St. Paul's, as Harline named it "Here, At The Edge Of The Sea", which later became our parish hymn and, in 2014, the name of our parish history book. This name incorporates two ideas: our geographical position on the shores of Moreton Bay and, like the description on Joan's "Christ The King" cushion last week, the calling of the first four disciples by Jesus on the shore of the Sea of Galilee all those years ago.

On one vertical side of the cushion Harline has worked in red the phrase "Peace On Earth", words spoken by a group of angels to shepherds watching their sheep in fields outside Bethlehem on the night of Jesus' birth. The unexpected arrival of these angels, together with their wonderful saving message, at first astonished and frightened the shepherds, who then quickly overcame their initial reaction, left their flock and hastened to locate the newborn baby.



At this present time, peace in many countries seems to be elusive, but hopefully this situation might change. Please continue to pray for peace every where.

Our latest balance stands at \$4,048.90 equating to 404,890 bottles, cans and cartons delivered over six years: a great effort from the twelve folk who collect the items, deliver them to the various outlets and forward the cash to me, to be banked by our Treasurer, Nicholas. Three recent payments were from Chris Wood, Desley and Shirley. I congratulate the twelve participants and encourage you to continue supporting this environmentally friendly project, which fits in nicely with our parish mission statement. A suggestion has been made by environmentalists to increase the payment for each article to 20 cents, replacing the current 10 cents. We are all hoping this will happen soon.








Cursillo Brisbane 40th Anniversary Continued.

- 1. Step into sacred space being together in community with people who share the same uplifting experiences like worship, fellowship, singing hymns together. We can make going to church a deliberate entry into a liminal space.
- 2. Celebrate in person being together with others creates bonds of support not found in the digital world, like breaking bread together around a common table or at the altar-rail. Take time in the Eucharist to smell, feel, taste the bread and wine as you take and eat.
- **3. Plan for Stillness and Silence** "Meditation helps to calm the monkey mind," it promotes empathy. Separating ourselves from the noise and complexity of human interactions. Practise being silent and listen.
- **4. Love others** smartphones, social media, train us to be absorbed in ourselves, teaching us to be self-absorbed, judgmental, boastful; whereas out-going compassion and care heal the inner spirit. Give yourself a sabbatical from your media.
- **5.** Be quick to forgive, slow to anger social media trains us to be angry and make snap judgments, be hypercritical of others. Jesus said, "Do not judge, so that you may not be judged." It is important to be angry at injustice, but be very careful about snap judgments.
- **6. Find awe in nature** we cannot over-state the way in which being present in the natural world brings calmness and ennobles the spirit. Psalm 19, "The heavens are telling the glory of God and the firmament proclaims his handiwork." Liminal space in nature is so refreshing.


MU ends the Year with 16 Days of Action
